


Cover story for the Ravalli Republic Newspaper **Birdy, It's Cold Outside**

- "Nature Therapy!"


Loss of Simone the Red-tail

Sonora Day

Sonora the Aplomado Falcon gets a beak-trim twice a year, called "coping" in the falconry world. Raptor beaks tend to overgrow in

captive situations for some unknown reason, and coping takes a minute, maybe two, toenail clippers, fingernail file, and round chainsaw file and done! Might take a bit longer for a Bald Eagle, same thing. Here she is right this minute with the new art on the wall, photo of her flying on the top right.

(She joined us as a downy in 2003, a gift from the Peregrine Fund's breeding program.)







I hand off cards with eagle and other photos all over the place: friends, stores, doctors, our bank... and this seemed to be a favorite, male landing.

FAR RIGHT: Three chicks. BELOW: The male brought in a muskrat. Before that a squirrel, questionable chunks of meat, and even a fish or two.

The Nest Nearby

t takes 6 1/2 minutes to walk to the riverbank for shooting range. Photography at the eagle nest that is. Three chicks this year and incubation starting on March 4th, earliest yet by one day. We watch the nest from the living room scope and that's how we know, so lucky. Nest built in 2011 so a huge

distraction. Buddy
Barry Gordon
has asked me
more than once,
"How many Bald
Eagle photos
do you need?"
Apparently 10,956.
I added 'em up, no
kidding.







When I went down to the beach with the dogs, the female eagle was perched at the top of the nest tree. I settled down to wait for her departure and just after she split (nice photos), a HUGE splash of whitewash (poop) in the river right in front of me. I looked up and the male had been spying on us the whole time, about 40 minutes! Still there when I left. In April he landed right over our heads. Curious (fearless) bird.

Wild Turkey Family at the bird feeder where I scatter seed from the pigeon building on the ground. Starting with 12 "poults" or youngsters, one week later 10, then 8. Youngsters have been seen as late as mid-October in Montana, eggs numbering 8-15, often 11-13. Turkeys are a wild native bird that was domesticated and reintroduced in the state. Funny as the bird feeder also supplies California Quail, Eurasian Collared Doves, and Chinese Ring-necked Pheasants.




Who doesn't love a hummingbird and the most Rufous and Black -chinned (here a female) we have ever had at our feeders and flowers, especially the Salvia on the deck.






