We'll start by blessing Sibley the Greatest Pal that ever lived, and thanks to the hundreds that have sent condolences, her friends and admirers. We are so privileged to have had her as a constant companion for more than 22 years. I always loved so see her staring out window of


the Suburu on her way to a program or duck hunt, surprising anyone driving nearby. My favorite was high-speed traffic in Spokane and the guy motioned me to roll down my window. "There's a bird in your car!" No, four actually.

We are lucky to have our Bald Eagles here year 'round and started incubating on March 9th, fledged two on July 1st, a bit early this year.





30 education programs this year, just like 2024 and each one a favorite, kids and adults alike. In our Five Valleys Audubon gig in October we had the honor of being labeled as "The Legendary Kate Davis" Too much, but one attendee did say "awesome." I remember someone at the 1000th education program at Lee Metcalf Refuge shouting, "See you at number 2000!" That seemed inconceivable at the time, but we are getting close. In every program, we'll all promise to venture outside and hoot up an owl as a finale. Happily, some wild birds are cooperating with poses like this Great Blue Heron most days at the river by the house, daily walk with the dogs. My therapy, Nico and Mose and camera then come back for some Art Inertia, drypoint etchings and nine this year. Two of herons, one more on the way. Let's welcome 2026 and the out-of-doors. We live in a wonderful natural environment around here, wouldn't you say?

## Our Brief Buddy Bird, Bodie

It is always heartbreaking to report the demise of a family member and here a whole page and issue, practically. Bodie the American Kestrel was handed off as a downy baby after her nest tree was sawed down in late June 2023. We have had a brother and sister team of kestrels here for ten years, and sadly the female Ella had died over the winter. The siblings shared hundreds of programs over that decade with us.

We thought that this female would make a nice companion for Wes the male. With the high mortality of raptors in general, and the fact that this young female was habituated to humans, we thought she would make a great addition to our Teaching Team. She was Wes' roommate and sadly, Bodie died in June, right in my hand. She had laid one intact egg two days prior and this second one was in fragments. Somehow this was a reproductive tragedy, and poor Wes is again alone in the enclosure after females for 12 years. We miss you, little girl.



Named for Bodie, California, a ghost town from Gold Rush Days, and the birthplace of our grandmother on my father's side. She was a tough little falcon, and quite vocal *chittering*.

### Passing of an Icon: Sibley dies at age 22, long-lived and loved

Our Hero Bird, Sibley has died. The evening before she was fine, and next afternoon I was cradling her for a half hour with her labored breathing as I sat on the edge of the Falconhouse. Every morning I would tell her "Five more years." Well, it worked for a long time Thankfully. I was reminding her of all her amazing stories and conquests. She opened her eyes and died at 2:30, in my arms. Buried by the building, wrapped in a Sibley t-shirt from 22 years ago.

Every morning since we got the Falconhouse I would walk over there first thing and see if she was still with us, half the time barefoot on the gravel in the driveway. I added it all up- 764 formal education programs and 962 tours over here, for 72,000 audience members, young and old alike. Then there were the 4 TV shows, Animal Planet and PBS, one BBC. And for exercise and hunting I figured she flew about 2500 times (most days, 7 months a year, 20 years.) She only spent one night out. Now THAT was a night I didn't sleep. I followed the "beep" telemetry signal all the way to Stevensville, and turned out it was a kennel full of mountain lion hunting dogs with transmitters on their collars, the same frequency. The owner turned them all off and silence. Then I found her standing in a fence at Lee Metcalf Refuge, begging. Whew.

Sibley could have been electrocuted or shot, hit a fence or killed by an eagle or owl. She did catch game like ducks and pheasants. Not enough to keep us fed (an old joke by John Craighead) but kept me on my toes. We were so fortunate to fly every Sunday at a ranch in Corvallis, the absolute highlight of the week, or of all time, for the two of us.

More importantly, Sib was the star educator for my favorite topic-

Falcons. Few stories are as dramatic as Peregrine reintroduction and recovery, or their hunting tactics, breeding strategies, everything about them. We know that she excited more than one eager youngster (or grownup) into sitting at a nest cliff with binoculars... and maybe a camera. I counted the physical numbers at programs but she touched thousands. And we counted lots of you more than once. R.I.P. and Love, Sibley!

Sibley meets her namesake, hero David Sibley, at Pine Butte Guest Ranch near Choteau. He is the guru of field guides and a dear friend. We were so lucky to have had eight years of programs together with The Nature Conservancy, and we met up at conferences and even shared a booksigning spot in Salt Lake City.

He wrote this email: "I just heard about Sibley's passing and wanted to let you know how sorry I am. She was a great bird and I was honored to share her name.

The neighbors suggested that I move my buildings, but they are all attached to the ground with a 2 foot of trench all around, hardware cloth sunk down and curving out as weasel-proofing. Plus vegetation is growing on the buildings for shade. Impossible. I was told this structure is for storage of "construction equipment and hot-rod collection."



knew we had to move a bunch of birds and thought of Miller Barns. I was standing front of a gorgeous greenhouse at their lot in Stevensville talking to owner Tim Schrock on the phone. "Can you make it 16 feet long, slanted roof, divided in half, doors on either end?" SURE and two weeks later, the new Falconhouse was delivered/installed south of the driveway. It was to house Sibley and Mischa, BEAUTIFUL building, Miller Barns. I wrote a 5-star review.



There is no shade here, so I installed 3-inch insulation under the roof, fans running all day, and little pine trees planted all around, and 100 degrees in the sun. I had to move Sibley inside every day at 2 p.m. all summer, unless it was cloudy and cool. Next spring Dave Plummer is painting reflective white material on the roof. It's rumored to work wonders, and this is probably where we will have to move Sonora the Aplomado Falcon when the neighbors move in.

In our 24th year at the Raptor Ranch in the Bitterroot Valley, we were subjected to a huge face-lift in March. New neighbors and changes in the neighborhood required us to relocate half our birds. They built an 80' x 40', 30 foot tall warehouse next to the fence and the first three buildings, six actual enclosures, were emptied.

Our birds have happily never been disturbed - the previous owner Bob Tavares would alert me when he was mowing the field so I could move them. Simon went out to the pigeon loft (for a while), Little Billie moved to an enclosure by the garage, Sonora down to the rehab spot. Then the big buy - the Falconhouse. Our pal Andy Snowden built a perfect pad, just in time for installation and the warehouse construction next door.



Sibley's 3 year-old cousin Mischa has had a major behavior change. (Their mothers are half-sisters from the same breeder.) She is terrified when leaving the new building. Looking into the sky she leaps off the glove screaming and spinning and nailing me. I have tried plans A, B, and C to get her calmed down. Plan D is placing a hood on her head to move her as she is fine in the house where she was raised since a baby. Mischa was the sweetest bird we have ever met, and only hope she will come around for programs and flying. Sibley's twin and so disconcerting.



#### Raptors Relocates!



Cover Story in 2001! We bought 10 acres on the Bitterroot River in Florence after 13 years at a rental in Clinton. I designed and carpenters Dave Plummer and Mike Hupe built all new enclosures, thanks to a generous donation and help from Boyce Lumber, Grizzly Fence, Cenex... everyone. We had 20 raptors on the Teaching Team at the time. Enclosures were placed on the north side of our place at the suggestion of the guys.

The harshest sun rays of the summer would strike the back and roofs of the buildings and not the birds directly. Plus I planted dozens of relocated pine trees, and Bitterroot Restoration brought native shrubs. Shade cloth was stapled up, and in one case, water misters and a fan for the white Gyrfalcon. Voila! Shade and quiet solitude they enjoyed their entire lives.








# Birds Are People, Too (and other stories) Kate Davis Raptors of the Rockies

Sibley is smart and playful and has been her companion on much of her raptor journey, perking by her side for years, a lively but very well-behaved raptor as a part of the educational programs Kate has done for school children and the public in Montana and around the country, Kate has presented nearly 2,000 educational programs for over 141,000 children and adults since she founded Raptors of the Rockles in 1988.





